
## 17. Mandala of Marici



The central deity is the Three-faced Six-armed (*Trimukhā Sadbhujā*) Mārīcī (Ḥod zer can ma¹) surrounded by eight goddesses in the eight directions: Arkamasī², Indumasī (Marka ma sī³), Antardhānamasī⁴, Tejomasī⁵, Udayamasī⁶, Gulmamasī⁶ (so in Tibetan), Vanamasī⁶ (according to Tibetan), and Cīvaramasī⁶. Throughout this mandala Tibetan has borrowed the Sanskrit names, without translating them.

In the second circle (*dvitīyapuṭa*) there are twelve goddesses, with two goddesses in each of the four cardinal directions and one each in the intermediate corners: Mahācīvaramasī<sup>10</sup>, Varāhamukhī<sup>11</sup> (Tib. ºmu khi ni), Padākramamasī (dā kra ma sī<sup>12</sup>), Varāli<sup>13</sup>, Parākramamasī<sup>14</sup>, Vadālī (Bi da li<sup>15</sup>), Ugramasī (Ūra ma ma sri<sup>16</sup>), Varāhī (Bā ra li<sup>17</sup>), Varttālī (Ba tā li<sup>18</sup>), Vadāli<sup>19</sup>, Varālī<sup>20</sup>, Varāhamukhī<sup>21</sup>.

The four gates are guarded by  $\overline{A}lo^{22}$ ,  $T\overline{a}lo^{23}$ ,  $K\overline{a}lo^{24}$ , and Matsaro (Sa ta tsa  $lo^{25}$ ) who are termed  $dv\overline{a}rap\overline{a}l\overline{\iota}$ .
